Carnival Win Jinx in SYL?

The South Yosemite League team winning the fourth annual Football Carnival Friday night at Memorial Stadium will be trying to break a regular-season jinx in the grid campaign to follow.

In the three years that the Carnival has been in existence, the team winning this event hasn't gone on to win the South Yosemite League championship.

South High was victorious in the first Carnival, but Bakersfield High went on to the SYL title. The Rebels repeated as Carnival winners two years ago, but Foothill came out ahead in the SYL championship chase. East Bakersfield was last year's Carnival crown-wearer, but when the league race was over, it was North High who came out on top.

In addition to being a fundraising event for the PTA, the Carnival also serves as a chance for the high school coaches to get a look at all of their boys under game-type conditions before they get down to championship play.

Pre-game activity will get under way at 7 o'clock Friday night with the first game between Bakersfield and Foothill slated to start at 7:30. Foothill takes on West in the second 15-minute game with the Vikings and Drillers meeting in the third contest.


There will be a break at this point to allow the Carnival queens from each of the six participating schools to be introduced to the crowd.

The fourth contest will send North against South, to be followed by a match between the Rebels and East. The final game will pit North against the Blades. All money raised from the Carnival goes into the PTA scholarship fund. Tickets may be purchased at the high schools at 50 cents for junior college, high school and elementary school students. Adults can also buy their tickets at the schools for \$1.25.

There will be a ticket sale at the stadium the night of the game for \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for children 14 years and under.

The Carnival has been a financial success with 13,874 attending last year's game. With West joining the league this season, an even larger crowd can be expected Friday night.

MR. THERON L. McCUEN
District Superintendent

District Superintendent Theron L. McCuen of the Kern County Union High School District is a staunch and enthusiastic friend of interscholastic athletics.

A native-born Californian, he played football, basketball and baseball at Ione High School He earned his A.B. degree at Stanford University and his Master of Arts degree there a year later.

From 1929 to 1936 Mr. McCuen taught Engineering Drawing and Mathematics at Bakersfield High School and Bakersfield College. In 1936 he became Assistant Superintendent in Charge of Business Affairs of the Kern County Union High School and Junior College District. In 1945 he was appointed District Superintendent.

The Kern Joint Junior College District, which operates Bakersfield and Porterville Colleges, was established in 1961, and he has served as Superintendent of both districts since then.

As District Superintendent, Mr. McCuen has spearheaded the planning and construction of the Bakersfield College campus as well as Arvin, North, South, Foothill, and West High Schools, the relocation of Burroughs and Kern Valley High Schools and additions to Bakersfield, East Bakersfield, McFarland and Shafter High School plants.

In all of these operations, facilities for the development of healthy bodies as well as sound minds were included on each campus, including the much-used Memorial Stadium at Bakersfield College.

Mr. McCuen is a recognized leader in educational circles. In 1961 he was president of the California Association of School Administrators and has participated on educational programs and conferences of national scope. He has recognized the values of participation in interscholastic athletics.



MR. THERON S. TABER, JR. Deputy Superintendent

Mr. Theron S. Taber, Jr., Deputy Superintendent of the Kern County Union High School District, has been a strong and consistent booster of athletic programs for many years.

A native of Texas, he played football at Abilene High School prior to attending Texas A and M. He earned his A.B. degree at Stanford University in engineering and mathematics, where he also took his Master of Arts degree in mathematics.

In 1928 Mr. Taber became an instructor at Bakersfield College. From 1939 to 1942 he was Dean of Men, and also for a time was Director of Athletics. He was the first chairman of the college engineering and mathematics department.

After service as an officer in the Navy during World War II, 1942-45, Mr. Taber was named Assistant Superintendent in Charge of Business Affairs of the Kern County Union High School and Junior College District in 1945. In 1951 he became Deputy Superintendent.

With the formation of the Kern Joint Junior College District in 1961, he has served both the high school and junior college districts as Deputy Superintendent.

He has had responsibilities of serving in a liaison capacity between the Districts and architects and contractors in the construction of Memorial Stadium at Bakersfield College as well as athletic facilities in high schools of the District built since 1945. There have been several.

Mr. Taber has accepted responsibilities in the civic life of the community and presently is Vice President in Charge of Finance, Southern Sierra Boy Scout Council.

In this small pamphlet we cannot present all you need to know about your DAT scores. Your counselor, who has studied the Manual for the DAT, can help you better understand what your test results show.

Eact test is first described in terms of the ability measured. Then follow some suggestions about the meaning of high, average, and low scores. Any occupations mentioned in these paragraphs are example NOT prescriptions. Remember these two things about the world of work:

There are thousands of different kinds of jobs. The careers mentioned below are only illustrations.

Among people in any career -- say, carpenters, secretaries, or engineers -there is a considerable range of competence;
so no one can tell you the exact minimum
test scores necessary to enter a field of
work.

Remember, too, that colleges vary in their requirements. Some colleges will be closed to you unless you rank in the upper tenth on these test scores; other colleges have different policies and a lower than average score on these tests would not close the door.

The world of work is complex! Your aptitude test scores can help you think better about your career and the educational steps needed to enter it, by helping you understand yourself better.

ABOUT THE DIFFERENTIAL APTITUDE TESTS

VERBAL REASONING _ How well can you understand ideas expressed in words?

How clearly can you think and reason with words?

Verbal reasoning is important in all academic and non-academic subjects in high school. Students who score average or better should seriously consider college; those well up in the top quarter may consider the highly selective colleges.

Students not planning for college who have VR as the peak of their profile should consider preparing for such verbal occupations as salesman, credit manager, order taker, or other such jobs in which verbal reasoning and understanding are essential.

Persons who do poorly on the Verbal Reasoning test should perhaps plan on going into some work that will call for less verbal ability.

NUMERICAL ABILITY - How well do you understand
ideas expressed in numbers?
How clearly can you think and
reason with numbers?

Numerical ability is especially important in such high school subjects as mathematics, physics, and chemistry.

Students who do well on this test are likely to do well in the arithmetic and measuring so common in factories, service shops, and stores.

Numerical ability is also useful in technical careers not requiring a college degree. A score in the second or third quarter on this test suggests looking at technical training programs either in companies or in training institutes for trades and crafts.

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PERCENTILES

The numbers that tell how well you did on each test are in the row marked "Percentiles". Your percentile tells where you rank on a test in comparison with boys and girls in your grade.

Think of "percentile" as meaning "per cent of people." In your case the people are boys and girls in your grade in many schools across the country. If your percentile score on one test is 80, you are at the top of 80 per cent of the group - only 20 per cent made higher scores than you. If you

scored in the 25th percentile, this would mean that about 75 per cent of the group did better than you. Thus a percentile rank always indicates your relative standing among a theoretical 100 persons representing a large group.

For each test make a heavy short li across the column at the level whice corresponds to your percentile rank on that test. Black in the columns up to or down to the 50-line from the short line you have just made. The vertical bars on your profile show the strength of your tested aptitude, up or down from the middle student of your grade. Numerical ability is useful in such jobs as lab assistants, bookkeeper, foreman, or shipping clerk. Many of the jobs in the skilled trades require considerable numerical ability.

VR + NA - A MEASURE OF SCHOLASTIC ABILITY

Your combined score on these two tests provide a good estimate of your scholastic antitude -- your ability to complete the college preparatory courses in your school and to succeed in college.

In general, anyone with a rating in the upper quarter (75th percentile or better) should consider himself capable of performing well in college. A second quarter rating on these two tests also indicates good college potential. Whether students ranking in the third and fourth quarters should enter regular college programs is arguable but these students might find it practical and satisfying to enter a one or two year junior college program.

ABSTRACT REASONING - How well do you understand
ideas which are not presented
in words or numbers? How well
do you think out problems even
when there are no words to
guide you?

The Abstract Reasoning test measures how easily and clearly you can reason when problems are presented in terms of size or shape or position or other non-verbal, non-numerical forms. Carrying out a logical procedure in your mind is important here.

Abstract Reasoning teams up with the next two tests -- Space Relations and Mechanical Reasoning--in prediction of success in many kinds of mechanical, technical, and skilled work.

Students scoring high on VR and NA have added confirmation of their college ability if they are also above average on Abstract Reasoning. If VR and NA are high and AR is below average, they usually may rely on the verbal-numerical combination to see them through.

Studeths scoring rather low on VR but fairly high on AR have evidence of ability to reason in certain ways despite a verbal shortcoming. Vocabulary building, remedial reading, and similar exercises may help strengthen verbal reasoning.

SPACE RELATIONS - How well can you visualize, or form mental pictures of solid objects from looking at flat paper plans? How well can you think in three dimensions?

Space relations measures your ability to visualize and imagine the shape and surfaces of a finished object before it is built. This ability makes some kinds of mathematics easier.

To a person who does poorly on space relations, an architect's plan for a house or an engineer's plans for a bridge or machine might look like nothing but several flat drawings.

Students doing well on SR should have an advantage in work such as drafting, dress designing, and diemaking. A machinist or surgeon needs this sense of the forms and positions of things in space. Students planning for careers not requiring college training should consider their SR score in comparison with their other aptitudes in deciding whether to look for jobs (or training courses) that deal with real objects -- large or small, watches or skyscrapers-rather than with people or with finances, for example.

MECHANICAL REASONING - How easy do you grasp the
common principles of physics
as you see them in everyday
things about you? How well
do you understand the laws
governing simple appliances,
tools and motions?

Students who do well on the Mecahnical Reasoning test usually like to find out how things work. They often are better than average in learning how to construct, operate, or repair complicated equipment.

Students who do well on this test but whose VR and NA scores suggest college courses might be difficult, should look into opportunities in high school technic courses, approntice training, and post-high-school technical institutes. Men in industry who become technicians, shop foreman, and repair specialists ten to be at least average in MR.

To Our P.T.A. Friends:

The Bakersfield Elementary Teachers Association is seriously concerned about educational conditions in Bakersfield.

We are concerned that our Board of Education and administration continue to adopt and adhere to salary and personnel procedures which discourage well trained and experienced teachers from seeking employment in the Bakersfield Elementary School District, or remain here as career teachers.

We are concerned with the increasing size of school classes. We know from our experience that small classes mean better learning, and that in large classes, little, if any individual instruction can be given, with a resulting drop in the learning rate.

During this school year the average class size in Bakersfield was 31.9 while the average for similar districts in California was only 29.3. In addition Bakersfield Elementary this year has 208 classes ranging in size from 35 to 45 pupils per class.

We are also concerned that our Board of Education and administration have not complied with either the letter or spirit of state laws pertaining to professional negotiations and school budgeting procedures.

In addition we are concerned with lowering teacher morale, poor staff communications and frequent lack of support in maintaining reasonable pupil discipline.


