

# IT'S DR. JENSEN'S LAST YEAR AT SOUTH HIGH

## Principal Promoted To Post As Assistant Superintendent

Beginning July 1, 1968, the Southern General, Dr. Grant W. Jensen, will ride off into the sunset of the South High scene to assume his new responsibilities as assistant superintendent of instruction in the district office. Dr. Jensen's promotion to this important position is the culmination of 27 years of dedicated service to the Kern County Union High School District.

Dr. Jensen came to Bakersfield in 1940 and joined the social studies department at East High after receiving his bachelor's degree in history from the University of California at Berkeley. Later he earned with highest honors his master's and doctorate of education degrees from Stanford.

The principalship of McFarland High was filled in 1948 when Dr. Jensen was appointed to that post. Three years later, he took over duties as principal of Shafter High, and then, in 1957, became principal of the newly established South High. It was under Dr. Jensen's able leadership for the next 11 years that South High has become what it is now—the best in Kern County.

Much of what the school has now can be attributed to the efforts of Dr. Jensen. He took a leading hand in establishing the school's scholarship fund, and founded the Principal's Medal, which gives special recognition to outstanding students in various fields. Dr. Jensen also pioneered the familiar advisory program which has been initiated by many other schools, and was chief instigator of team teaching and flexible scheduling (block program).

Dr. Jensen's administration has been responsible, too, for many firsts, both in curriculum and in extracurricular activities. The basic projects program, the audio-lingual method of teaching foreign languages, the reading program (which was a carryover from Dr. Jensen's work at Shafter), the drum and bugle corps, recognition banquets (for non-curricular activities), and scholarship banquets are all examples of the administrator's contributions to the school.

When Dr. Jensen leaves, he will be leaving behind him a desk that will be very difficult to fill. But a very capable former South High administrator, Mr. Don Murfin, will be trying very hard to do this when he takes over the principal's office next summer.

Mr. Murfin came to South High in 1959 as a science teacher and as director of

## A Salute to Our Gridders

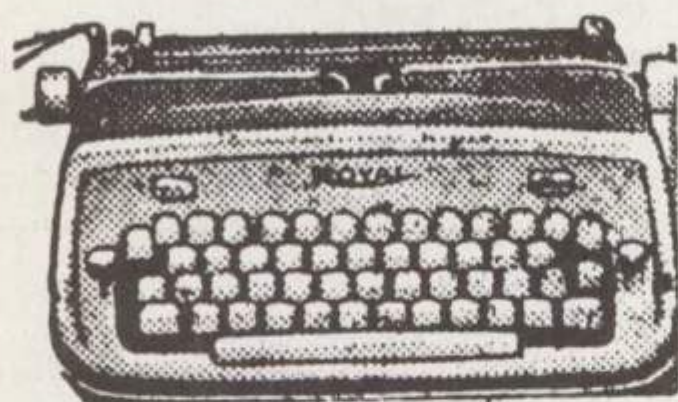

Though the Rebel record wasn't quite as impressive, the players tried their best on the field—and that's all that really counts. A special salute to them for whipping the Blades in the last game!

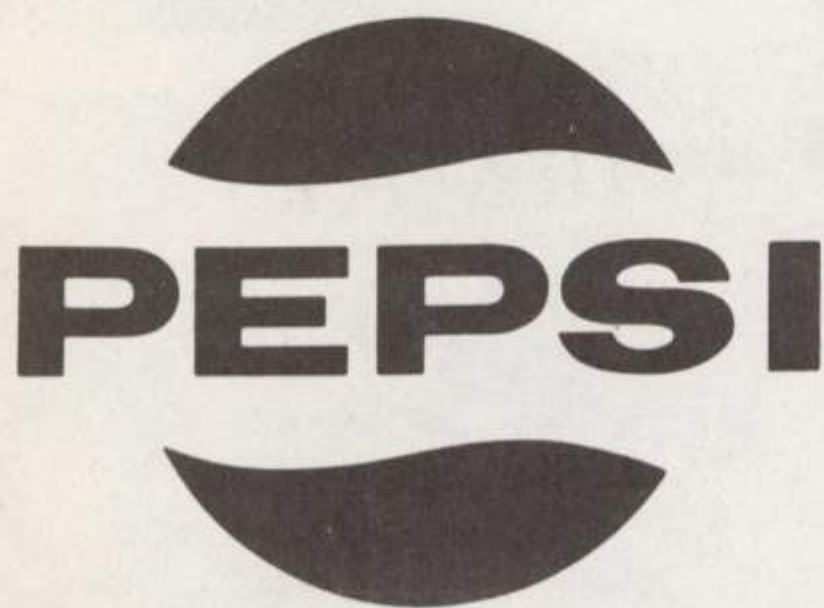

seen him effectively use his leadership abilities as ASB president.

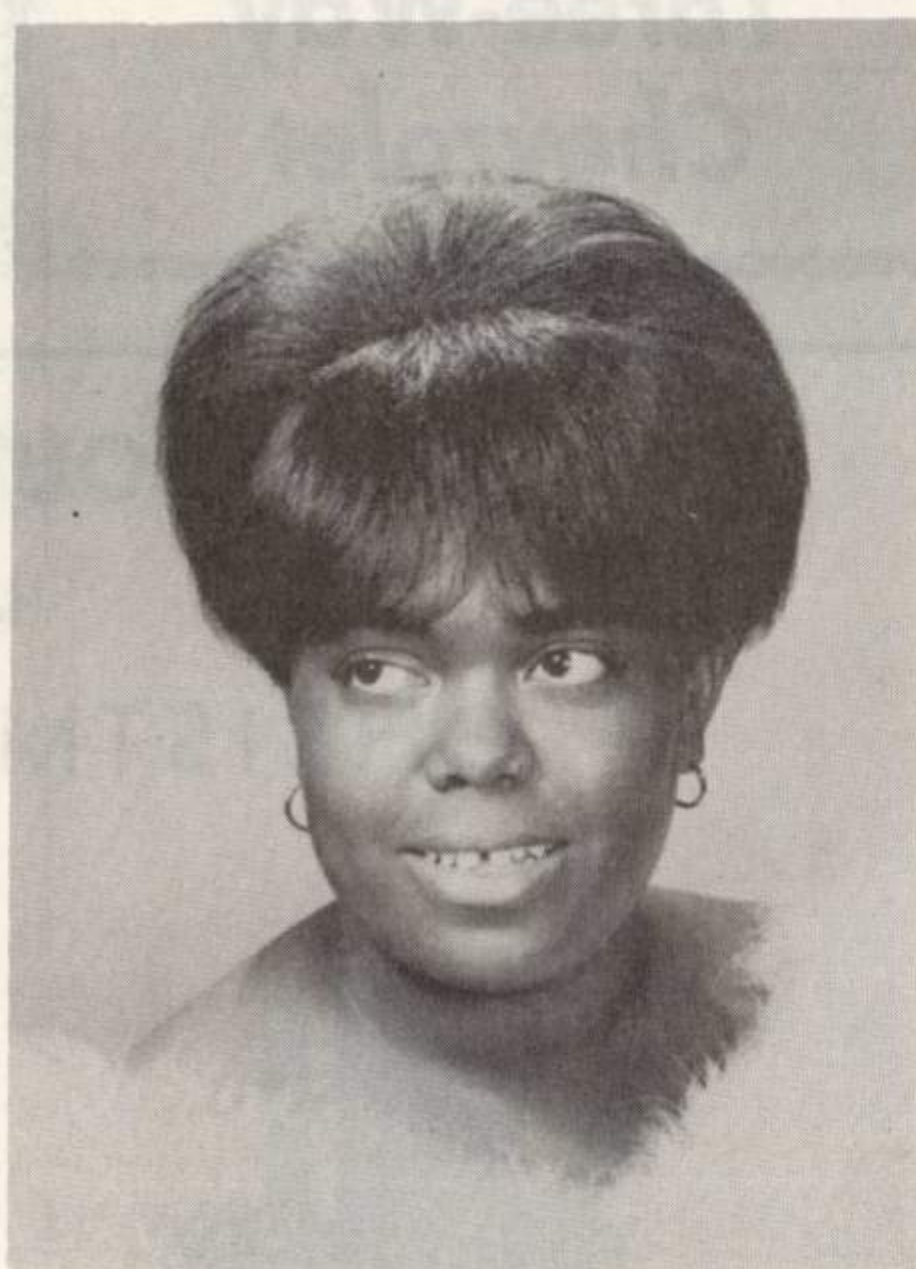

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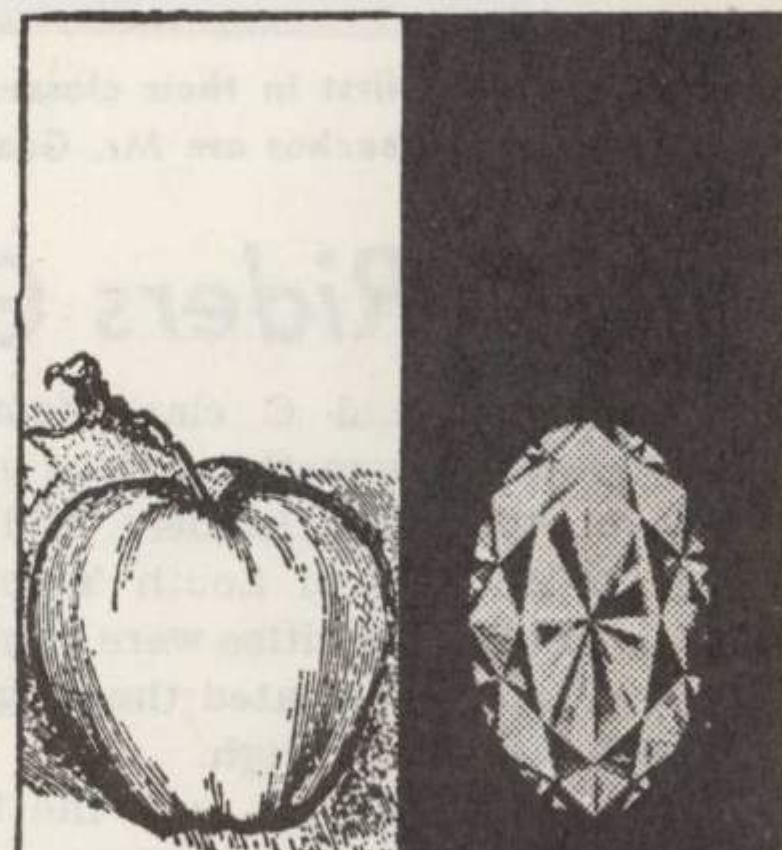
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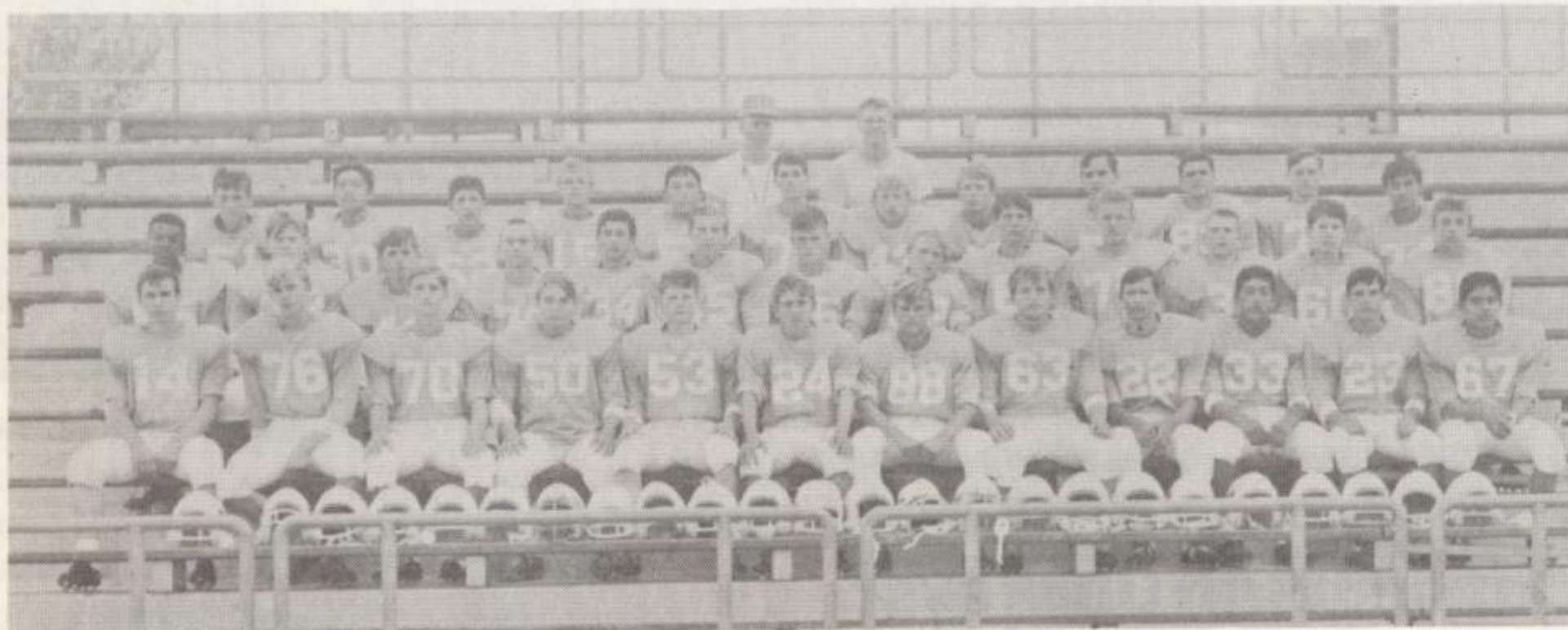

## Raiders, Riders Garner SYL Crowns

South High's B and C class football teams are definitely something to be proud of this year. Both the Raiders and the Riders claim the title of South Yosemite League champions. The titles were clinched when the two teams defeated the Daggers and the Dirks of East High.

The Raiders scored 21-6 over the Daggers with Ron Sessions and Kenny Hall making the touchdowns. This win gives the Raiders a total of 228 points for the season compared with 50 points for their opponents. The B's nine wins and one tie not only give them the championship but also makes them the first undefeated B team of South High.

Raider coach Mr. George Van Pelt commented, "This is certainly an outstanding team. Their attitude and high spirit leaves little to be desired."

Rob Foster ran 66 yards on the first

play to make the only touchdown in the Riders' game against the Dirks of East High. Jim Patrick kicked for the extra point, making the score 7-0 in favor of the Riders. "It was certainly a defensive game," said Rider Coach Mr. Clete Harper. "They only crossed our 50-yard line once."

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## REBEL GRIDDERS DEFEAT BLADES IN 'LAST GAME'

A strong Rebel line held the East High Blades to but thirty yards and no score Friday, November 17, as they proceeded to shut out the Blades 6-0 in the last game of the year, and thus give themselves a 2-2-1 South Yosemite League and 3-5-1 overall record.

The game was clearly a defensive struggle, the only score of the game coming early in the fourth quarter after a short punt by East went out of bounds on the Blades' 25 yard line. The Rebs, then in possession of the ball, proceeded to march into the end zone in seven plays. Eugene Walker carrying the ball over from three yards out. South then failed at the conversion attempt, leaving the score at 6-0.



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## VARSITY DEFEATED; B's, C's WIN

"Improvement" is the key word to last week's basketball scene, with the Raiders and Riders both victorious in their second season games, and with the Rebels, though they lost both games, making a fine showing at the Porterville tournament.

The B class Raiders stomped their Tulare counterparts 44-15 last Saturday. It was a running game, according to Coach Charles Rekosh, with a lot of fast breaking. Each team had opportunity to show his stuff, with outstanding offensive skill showed by Steve Lagore, who had 15 points; and Doug Palla, who was outstanding in defense.

The C class Riders also pulled through a win against their opponents, 41-21. Possibly because the team is inexperienced, with 11 freshmen and 4 sophomores, the team started the game rather slowly. But they later broke away, scoring 17 points to Tulare's one point in the third quarter and Coach Steve Strauss claims their play was a deliberate improvement over that of the previous game with Wasco. Frosh Steve Blado took scoring honors with 9. Willie Wright and Robert Coffee followed with 7 and 6 points, respectively.

Oddly enough, the Rebels' first tournament game was with the Tulare varsity hoopsters. Losing 45-42 to the Redskins, the Rebs were close to victory when, with two minutes to play remaining, the score stood 39 to 42, with South leading. At this point, however, center Doug Bowers fouled out of the game, and Tulare went ahead to take the contest. Bowers had 16 points, followed by Mike Beckerdite with 12.

Saturday the Rebs lost to the Porterville Panthers, 48-33. Once again, the hoopsters were almost victorious with four minutes of play remaining and a tied up score of 33-33; and again, in a replay of

the previous game, Bowers fouled out. The Rebs scored some 16 points in the third quarter, as compared to 8 made by their opponents. The team was also handicapped by the absence of Beckerdite, Jeff Burns, and Dirk Van Pelt, who were involved in taking college entrance exams.

Bowers led with 19 points, followed by Billy McDaniels and Dave Williams, with six and five, respectively.

## Distance Runners Finish 'Very Successful Season'

Southern cross-countryers have recently completed what Coach Steve Strauss referred to as a "very successful season." The coach was pleased with the showing made by all of his runners.

In the recent league meet held at the Kern River Golf Course, South's frosh-soph team emerged in second place out of six teams. Individual awards went to Kent Stotts, Joe Vega, and Raul Subia who earned third, fifth and eighth places, respectively, with 42 runners competing. Varsity runner Fred Contreras placed 10th out of 12.

Porterville was the site for the divisional meet and, as Coach Strauss said, it was the "high point of the season." Competing against 20 teams, the frosh-soph runners bagged the fourth place. In the varsity competition, Contreras came up in eighth place out of 147 runners.

Closing out their season at the valley meet in Fresno, the frosh-soph team placed seventh with 15 teams competing.

Returning runners will maintain the strength of the frosh-soph team, he reported, while Subia, Stotts, Vega, and Amador should provide a "good nucleus for the varsity team."

## Raiders Win Opener; Rebs, Riders Not Quite As Fortunate: Both Lose

Santa Maria is the destination of the Rebel hoopsters tonight as they enter into their third basketball game of the season. With that game starting at 8 p.m., the team will travel further up the coast to San Marcus for another tilt tomorrow afternoon at 2. Meanwhile, the Raiders and Riders remain here for an afternoon game with Bakersfield High here at 4 p.m.

In last week's action, the Rebels lost their opening game to the Wasco Tigers. According to Coach John Henderson, the Rebs were surprised at the strength shown by their counterparts; yet they they came back to play a "pretty good" game in the second half, though the final score was 59-48. High-point man for the Rebs was junior Doug Bowers with fifteen markers, while Dave Williams and Gary Plotner followed with eleven and ten, respectively.

Highlight of the evening's three games with the Wasco teams was that between the South Raiders and their counterparts, with South the victor, 27-24. The team came from behind to win, and according to Coach Charles Rekosh, the players made a lot of early season errors; nonetheless, Coach Rekosh, claims that the victory took a lot of good team effort, and he is "real pleased with the whole team's attitude and hustle." Outstanding players for the Wasco game were Steve Lagore, who garnered eleven points and was outstanding in his rebounding efforts; and Dave Hill and Mark Hance, who each played defensively and made four markers apiece.

The Riders fared only a little better than the Rebs, losing to their opponents 32-25. Coached by Mr. Steve Strauss, high point men were Robert Coffee and Jack Burns, each with eight points.

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## South's Matmen Defeat Shafter Generals, 50-5

Shafter was the first team to fall prey to the Rebel varsity (50-5) and junior varsity (56-5) matmen of Coach Joe Seay.

The Shafterites gained only one victory against each of South teams. The varsity won by five falls, two forfeits, and five decisions, while the JV'S were busy earning seven falls, four forfeits, and one decision.

The only varsity loss was in the 140-pound division where the wrestler was pinned. Ditto for the junior varsity squad, except that loss was in the 193-pound division.

According to Coach Seay, the 33 seconds it took Wallace Williams, the varsity heavyweight, to pin his opponent, was good time.

Varsity wrestlers who won their matches were Gary Finch, Dwight Rollins, Larry Copenhaver, John Cotton, Jack Fisher and Williams.
